This booklet is published by the Morden Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of acquainting you with the town of Morden. It was founded in 1885 and to date has a population of about 3500. Like most prairie towns the growth, although continuous, has been slow. Until the recent developments in transportation and communication only the larger urban centres have attracted the important industries. Now, however it seems another trend is emerging. The less desirable characteristics of city life, such as: air pollution; traffic congestion; noise; high costs of real estate; crime and violence, and other psychological and sociological factors, are daily becoming more apparent. Far-sighted management is beginning to recognize this, and in some cases is taking steps to relocate industries to more desirable locations.

Morden, in the past few years has benefitted greatly from this new trend. Quality Communication Products Ltd., the latest industry to locate here, is one example. It is a stable firm and will employ up to 60 people.

We believe Morden has much to offer. Compared to other towns its financial situation is excellent. The old conservative element is petering out and is being replaced by open-minded, aggressive young men who have discarded the old theories of introspection and isolationism. These men have set up a committee to advertise their town and if possible to attract those new industries which could thrive with the facilities available here.

They believe the town has a future. Come and try it for size and help it grow.


## All Stories Begin With Children




Those who don't know the prairies say they are flat and monotonous. They haven't seen the Pembina Hills which begin on the western outskirts of Morden. They rise gently, level off, rise again, forming a wide plateau of rich farmland between. A few miles out of town they rise to a height of 600 feet above the town. Here they suddenly dip sharply forming the scenic Pembina valley overgrown with poplar, oak, birch and a hundred other species of shrubs and trees. There in the summer and early fall you will find wild fruit in profusion — saskatoons, cranberries, chokecherries, and the meaty "nanny" berries which are anathema to adults but caviar to a country boy. Civilization is moving in but you can still find a spot for relaxation and a lazy day's fishing. In the fall hunters track the white-tail deer and in the winter the slopes are good for skiing.










MAIL LEAVES MORDEN AT 5:30 P.M. DAILY (Not Sunday) AND ARRIVES AT 7:00 A.M.
